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### What is Study Abroad?

Study Abroad: any type of international travel that involves an educational component – academic course work – that is applicable to a student's degree program



## **Types of Programs**



- Direct Exchange
- Intensive Language

- Short-term
- Provider Programs

#### **Direct Exchanges**



- Over 45 countries (100+ universities) from which to choose
- Pay UNM tuition
- Most scholarships and financial aid apply
- Credits transfer back to UNM
- Students can take classes in English AND/OR host country language

### **Intensive Language**





- Tuition is paid <u>directly</u> to the school
- Most scholarships and financial aid apply
- Short and long term programs available
- Transfer language credits back to UNM

#### Short-Term Programs



- Available around the world
- ⊘ 2 types:
  - Faculty-led
  - Other (non-faculty)
- Typically offered during winter/spring/summer breaks
- Scholarships may be available

#### **Provider Programs**



- Study Abroad Provider: an independent organization that administers study abroad programs for students.
- Students pay provider tuition and program fee/s
- Most scholarships and financial aid apply
- Credits transfer back to UNM (only accredited/approved providers and universities)
- Many provider programs are listed on our website

#### Financial



- Most scholarships/financial aid can be applied to study abroad programs if they occur during the academic year
- UNM Regents International Study Grant, Gilman and Boren Scholarships
- Eligibility for some outside scholarships based on need, destination or language
- Visit GEO website for an extensive list of scholarships
- Search on your own!

# Housing

- Type of housing varies per school/university/program
- Can be Dorms (Europe), Host Families (Latin America), or Shared Apartments
- Typically arranged AFTER acceptance to school
- Paid for in Host Country (typically NOT in US Dollars)









- All credits transfer back as "generic credit" initially
- To transfer study abroad course work as a <u>SPECIFIC</u> UNM course you must follow specific procedure outlined by UNM
- Be sure to secure these credits before leaving as well as when you return all credits are PENDING until Transcripts AND International Exception Form are submitted after you return
- Remember to give us your transcript by March 1 for Fall or October 1 for Spring semesters, for scholarship purposes

# **Credit Equivalencies**



- To earn departmental credit for courses taken during an exchange program, you must get the courses approved by your academic advisor
- Find the course description and/or syllabus of the course you want to take on the website of the school you will attend
- Bring it to the advisor for the department in which you want to earn credit, along with an idea of how you would like it to transfer
- You can transfer courses as upper-level department elective credit if there is no direct equivalent at UNM
- Ask your study abroad advisor for help at any point

# **Application Process**

- Create profile
- Search the "STUDENTS" link to find important info on the application process
- Make an appointment with a Study Abroad Advisor
- Pay attention to Application Deadlines, think about Visas, etc

#### UNM Study Abroad Application Requirements



- Study Abroad Questionnaire with short essays
- Coursework Planning Draft list of classes you are interested in taking
- Two letters of recommendation for some programs (one must be from a professor)
- Application fee \$275 for semester programs; \$50 for faculty-led programs
- After being accepted by UNM study abroad, we will guide you through the application process of your specific program.
- Deadlines: Fall February 15
  Spring September 15
  Summer Varies
